Summer 2021 Archaeological Fieldwork Report

Dr. Damien Marken

In Summer 2021, Anthropology professor Dr. Damien Marken and several BU students were able to return to Guatemala to continue archaeological investigation of the ancient Maya city of El Perú-Waka' (ca. 200 BC-AD 1000). These investigations were carried out as part of the Waka' Archaeological Project (PAW) under a permit issued by the Guatemalan government. During PAW's 18th field season, from May 17-June 20, Marken, Zachary Cooper (Class of 2015) surveyed a 15 km² sector of the city's hinterland as part of an ongoing effort to document and verify the distribution of pre-Hispanic settlement in the region as identified by a recent 90 km² LiDAR survey. Former BU student Andrew Miller (Class of 2020) also participated in PAW's 2021 field season, assisting archaeologists Griselda Pérez and Juan Carlos Pérez in documenting excavated architecture of the city's ancient royal palace.

Following the field season, current student Miles Plunkett and alum Emily Haney (Class of 2018) analyzed ceramic materials from the El Perú-Waka' at PAW's lab house in Guatemala City. The materials analyzed included several complete vessels from a royal burial discovered by PAW archaeologists in 2017.
