Unless otherwise noted above, history majors and minors may substitute <u>only</u> one 200-level History course for <u>any</u> 100-level History course that is required for the major, conditional upon approval of the student's adviser and/or the department chair (in consultation with the instructor of the 200-level course).

The world regional and chronological focus of 200-level History courses does not always correspond with the regional and chronological focus of the required 100-level courses. 200-level courses often cover broad chronological periods that do not precisely match that of 100-level courses, and 200-level courses often have a comparative regional focus that do not precisely match that of 100-level courses.

Therefore, it is important that students work closely with History faculty advisers in determining the proper substitution of a 200-level history course for a 100-level History course. To ensure this, the substitution must be confirmed by the student's History major adviser and/or the department chair (in consultation with the instructor of the 200-level course).
