Dramaturg's Note

The year is 1592, and London's theatres are temporarily closed due to a riot at the Rose Theatre. A ban meant to last until the end of September continues until nearly a year later as London once more finds itself ravaged by plague. Amidst the disruption of their livelihood, William Shakespeare penned some of his best-known works, most notably *A Midsummer Night's Dream*: a play which remains Shakespeare's most widely produced work, serving as an exaltation of love and life in all its intricacies.

In the wake of another set of uncertain times, this play has dominated the theatrical season across the nation. Our production is a nod to traditions of theatrical practice and the metatheatrical, both ever-present in the world of Shakespeare's plays. The concept of metatheatre has existed since the art form's inception. The Greek prefix meta-meaning "situated behind or beyond" combines with the ephemeral nature of live theatre in unity with theatrical practice and spectatorship. Our adaptation explores each tenet of metatheatre from the first image of the play until the very last.

As Quince enters, moving a ghost light from center stage to prepare for rehearsal, they meet audiences in the space between the curtain speech and the first moment of the play. By inhabiting a plane where the veil between spectator and player is at its thinnest, they reach out to pull audiences inward, inviting them to embrace a world that is a heightened yet self-aware version of their own. In the play's final moments, Puck releases both player and audience to their lives, encouraging them to "recount their dreams" both witnessed and practiced onstage. Live theatre completes yet another rotation in its never-ending loop, as moments before the curtain speech and the curtain call connect.

The year is 2022, and with healing and a fresh set of eyes, we present an adaptation of a beloved classic in celebration of life, love, artistic expression in all its forms, and the enduring presence of live theatre.
