# AMNESTY

Students who witness or students who experience sexual misconduct who disclose any incident of sexual misconduct to University officials or law enforcement, acting in good faith, will not be sanctioned under the Student Code of Conduct for violations of alcohol and/or drug use policies occurring at or near the time of the incident.

### NON-DISCRIMINATION STATEMENT

The University prohibits any form of discrimination or harassment on the basis of sex, race, color, age, religion, national or ethnic origin, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression, pregnancy, marital or family status, medical condition, genetic information, veteran status, or disability in any decision regarding admissions, employment, or participation in a University program or activity in accordance with the letter and spirit of federal, state, and local non-discrimination and equal opportunity laws, such as Titles VI and VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, the Age Discrimination in Employment Act, the Americans with Disabilities Act and ADA Amendments Act, the Equal Pay Act, and the Pennsylvania Human Relations Act.

Non-disciplinary and non-punitive individualized services designed to restore or preserve access to the University's Education Programs or Activities without unduly burdening the offered, as appropriate, to the Complainant or the Respondent, regardless of whether a formal Complaint is filed. Supportive Measures may include, but are not limited to counseling, extensions of deadlines or other course-related adjustments, modifications of course-related adjustments, modifications of

work or class schedules, campus escort services, restrictions on contact between the parties, changes in work or housing locations, leaves of absence, and increased security and monitoring of certain areas of the campus.

All University Officials, Volunteers and Employees (including Student Employees) are obligated to report incidents of sexual misconduct of which they become aware to the Title IX Coordinator or designee.

# **CONFIDENTIAL RESOURCES**

The University also has individuals who are designated as a confidential resource. Counselors, Clergy, and the Doctor in the Health Center have confidential privilege and are not mandatory reporters.


Making a report is different from filing a formal complaint. A report is defined as notification of an incident of sexual misconduct to the Title IX Coordinator or designee by any person. A report may be accompanied by a request for: (1) supportive measures; (2) no further action; (3) a formal complaint and a request to initiate a formal resolution process (investigation); and/or (4) an informal resolution process.

### REPORTING

In an emergency, dial 911 Individuals may also report to Police in a non -emergency. Reporting to Police is related to legal action.
